

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading


The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the Lord." So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live."

I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude. Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. And you shall know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your own soil; then you shall know that I, the Lord, have spoken and will act," says the Lord.

May your glory, O Lord, endure for ever; may you rejoice in all your works; you look at the earth and it trembles; you touch the mountains and they smoke. *Refrain*

I will sing to the Lord as long as I live; I will praise my God while I have my being. May these words of mine please you; I will rejoice in the Lord. Hallelujah! *Refrain*

Second Reading

When the day of Pentecost had come, the apostles were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine." But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

The Gospel today is proclaimed in many tongues



In the beginning

And so I saw full surely that before ever God made us, he loved us. And this love was never quenched nor ever shall be. And in this love he has done all his works, and in this love he has made all things profitable to us, and in this love our life is everlasting. In our making we had beginning, but the love in which he made us was in him from without beginning, in which love we have our beginning.

Some say the Church began at Pentecost. If so, it was a noisy beginning. A counterweight to Babel, where language was a barrier. In Jerusalem, every language conveyed meaning. A clear meaning and a simple message. Save yourselves from this crooked generation (Acts 2: 40). It would not have started without the Holy Spirit, and it began in mission; evangelism of the traditional sort, telling people Good News. Good Tidings. Things we seem comfortable to hear in public at Christmas, but not similarly at Easter or Pentecost. Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins (Acts 2: 38). The last link in the church year, St Andrewstide just before Advent, used to be specifically set aside to remember Christian Mission, but we usually fail to do so now, explicitly at least. Nevertheless, the Holy Spirit kept the Early Church at it and She helped it grow, numerically and substantively. The new Christians joined a society where goods were held in common and distributed as needed. It was how they made Jesus's command to love each other tangible. Many years later, Lady Julian was granted a series of visions in a deep encounter with Jesus, whom she could not separate from God. Her experience was not particularly noisy, but her testimony is of the same love, reaching back before Pentecost to before the beginning of time. For her, God's love was the Word. Her faith was not transactional. Six hundred years further on, T.S. Eliot went to her *Revelations of Divine Love* as he grew into Christianity. Some of his most famous lines may have come from her, interpreted by him for the 20th century. They tell us the purpose (the end) of the Church and assure us of Julian's vision, individually and collectively.

LITURGICAL LEXICON...

Today marks the conclusion of the Easter, which has lasted for fifty days. Next week, we observe Trinity Sunday, and then move into the season after Pentecost or Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time is so called not because it is plain or hum-drum, but because the readings are "ordered". The Gospels especially follow the life and ministry of Jesus in a relatively sequential pattern. We will return to the Gospel of Mark for June and most of July, at which point we will then spend five weeks in the sixth chapter of John focussing on Jesus as the Bread of Life. In Ordinary time, we return to using the Apostolic greeting rather than the Easter greeting; the General Confession and Absolution returns at the 10:30 liturgy after its suspension during Easter to focus on the gift of our salvation through the cross. Starting in June, our frontals and vestments will return to green, reflecting life, growth and the created order unfolding in due course. Next week, the Paschal Candle returns to its customary location in the sanctuary but off to one side.
