# Second Reading

Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit. Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. # THE CALENDAR

#### Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

In 1964, Pope Paul VI promulgated Unitatis Redintegratio, the Second Vatican Council's decree on Ecumenism. He wrote the restoration of unity among all Christians is one of the principal concerns of the Second Vatican Council. It was a dramatic pronouncement given the Roman church's historic view of its position in Christendom, and because it recognized the authenticity of separated Christian communities. A well-known photograph, taken later, of Archbishop Michael Ramsey and the Pope sitting together near the altar of the Sistine Chapel demonstrated the intentions liberated by *Unitatis*. Some Anglicans remain ambitious to be reunited with Rome, our original separation being political not doctrinal. At a high level there is now greater understanding and agreement between us than in 1964, partly from careful attention to language. Our Bishop Baycroft played a significant part in this convergence. The differences that remain are principally matters of practice, not doctrine, and certainly do not concern anything covered by the Nicene or Apostles' creeds, both being fundamental statements we hold together. This is an example of progress towards church unity, and commonly the week we mark has directed our attention in this direction. Not necessarily towards Rome; usually to the Protestant diaspora.

But the week is not for Church Unity, it is for Christian Unity. In 2025, we may profitably look inward within our communion, an international church we claim is united though we may have alternative suspicions. It is hard to understand when we have settled matters at home why others should differ. In 2014, Archbishop Justin Welby spoke on an LBC Radio phone-in show: *I've stood by a graveside in Africa of a group of Christians who'd been attacked because of something that had happened far, far away in America,* he said. *What was said was that 'if we leave a Christian community in this area' — I am quoting them — 'we will all be made to become homosexual; so we are going to kill the Christians.' The mass grave had 369 bodies in it, and I was standing with the relatives. That burns itself into your soul.* For us, for me, it is unimaginable and oh so tempting to adopt a self-righteous response. But it is real. It tells us what is at stake. We may expect Christian unity on our terms, nurtured in tolerant and comfortable Canadian pews, of no cost to us. And we must not go back. The way forward is not clear and that is why we should be on our knees. All week.

# WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity runs from January 18 (the Confession of Peter) to January 25 (the Conversion of St. Paul) each year. The World Council of Churches produces an ecumenical service designed to highlight themes of unity amongst its member churches in the world.

WCC brings together churches, denominations and church fellowships in more than 120 countries and territories throughout the world, representing over 580 million Christians and including most of the world's Orthodox churches, scores of Anglican, Baptist, Lutheran, Methodist and Reformed churches, as well as many United and Independent churches. While the bulk of the WCC's founding churches were European and North American, today most member churches are in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Latin America, the Middle East and the Pacific. There are now 352 member churches.

As members of this fellowship, WCC member churches:

- are called to the goal of visible unity in one faith and one eucharistic fellowship;
- promote their common witness in work for mission and evangelism;
- engage in Christian service by serving human need, breaking down barriers between people, seeking justice and peace, and upholding the integrity of creation;
- foster renewal in unity, worship, mission and service.

2025 marks the 1700<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first Ecumenical Council at Nicaea (from which came the Nicene Creed.) An ecumenical service facilitated by the Christian Council of the Capital Area will be held at **4pm this afternoon (January 19)** at Ottawa Mennonite Church – 1830 Kilborn Ave. Dr. Murray Watson will be the preacher. All are welcome to attend.


