

Second Reading

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness. Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. 



THE CALENDAR

Attention from God

Some critics think that John Donne's Holy Sonnet XIV is his best. Certainly it completes its message exactly within 14 lines and certainly the two themes of the poem in the first eight lines and the last six are suitably contiguous but distinct. Certainly it displays his wit and ability to express spiritual desire surprisingly and succinctly. Throughout the sonnet Donne seeks God's attention. His language may be uncomfortable, as violence and physical allusion are not what we normally expect in a divine poem. But there is a lot of violence in the Old Testament and our physical bodies are as much a part of us as our souls, regardless of Victorian inhibitions. He writes knowing that God is involved with all of us. Donne wrote the Holy Sonnets before his ordination when he was acutely conscious that he was a sinner, that is, someone separated from God, who needed redemption. He wrote desperately but did not plead for mercy.

Some poems and psalms write about fear of God's anger and wrath. Punishment is the anticipated consequence and the supplicant begs mercy. What Donne feared instead was to be ignored or dismissed and that he would be denied close experience of God. We know Donne came to have a religious mind because of the intellectual sermons he wrote after his ordination. But earlier he was struggling. This holy sonnet, like the others, is a meditation. In each of them he described an image he used to focus his attention in prayer. As a besieged town, he was pleading for redemption yet acknowledging his resistance, desiring the town to fall and God to overcome the barriers he could not shake free from. He needed help from the Lord to become wholly His. He thought initially of surrender, but at the end of the poem, couples this with intimate joy.

Batter my heart, three-person'd God; for, you As yet but knock, breathe, shine, and seek to mend; That I may rise, and stand, o'erthrow me, and bend Your force, to break, blow, burn and make me new. I, like a usurp'd town, to another due, Labour to admit you, but Oh, to no end, Reason your viceroy in me, me should defend, But is captiv'd, and proves weak or untrue. Yet dearly I love you, and would be loved fain, But am bethroth'd unto your enemy: Divorce me, untie, or break that knot again, Take me to you, imprison me, for I Except you enthral me, never shall be free, Nor ever chaste, except you ravish me.
