THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading Proverbs 8:1-4, 22-31

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? On the heights, beside the way, at the crossroads she takes her stand; beside the gates in front of the town, at the entrance of the portals she cries out: "To you, O people, I call, and my cry is to all that live. The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water. Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills, I was brought forth - when he had not yet made earth and fields, or the world's first bits of soil. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above, when he established the fountains of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit, so that the waters might not transgress his command, when he marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him, like a master worker; and I was daily his delight, rejoicing before him always, rejoicing in his inhabited world and delighting in the human race."





THE CALENDAR

Common Prayer

The first half of the church year is programmed from Advent to Pentecost. The second began today. The first focused intently on Jesus's life. The second, 24 weeks long, will concentrate on His work. Who He is gives way to what He said. We begin theologically, for it is Trinity Sunday, the only Sunday in the year named for God the Father. And one of the few for the Holy Spirit, the others being at Jesus's baptism, the Annunciation, and Pentecost.

Much has been written about the Trinity, for some are interested in defining the undefinable. Over the last 2000 years, many people have encountered Jesus, perhaps as a vision or a voice, and they have always recognized Him. Many, many more have sensed the Holy Spirit, the presence of God, always in the present but perhaps recognized retrospectively. She may visit a single sense or several at once. George Herbert's *Prayer* mentions 28 examples of common experiences She brings. *Something understood*, he says at the end. Understanding deepens our intellectual awareness *and* reassures us. Sometimes, we call the Spirit's works coincidences. As they pile up around a particular passage of our lives they become harder to dismiss. C.S. Lewis preached *I believe that the sun has risen, not only because I see it, but because by it I see everything else.*

The few mystics are the people who encounter God the Father. They always drop *the Father*, for their experience is not personified, but of a state they describe as an awareness of deep Love. It comes in silence, not noiselessness but an absence of distractions within. The biography of Brother Lawrence called it *The Practice of the Presence of God*. The greatest distraction is pride, preoccupation with ourselves. Perhaps for this reason, these encounters are described almost anonymously. We know Mother Julian lived reclusively, but that is about all. She is not in the history books. From Malcolm Guite:

In the Beginning, not in time or space,
But in the quick before both space and time,
In Life, in Love, in co-inherent Grace,
In three in one and one in three, in rhyme,
In music, in the whole creation story,
In his own image, his imagination,
The Triune Poet makes us for his glory,
And makes us each each other's inspiration,
He calls us out of darkness, chaos, chance,
To improvise a music of our own,
To sing the chord that calls us to the dance,
Three notes resounding from a single tone,
To sing the End in whom we all begin;
Our God beyond, beside us, and within.

Detail of pew end in St. Bartholomew's, featuring the outline of a triquetra.

Derived from the Latin adjective triquetrus (three-cornered), this version of the triangular figure composed of three interlaced arcs is one of the many symbols associated with the Trinity. The outline version shown above is similar to the trillium flower, also representative of the Trinity, given the perfect balance of the blossom. Not all pew ends at St. Bartholomew's have this version. Can you find the pews that do?
