## THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading Lamentations 1:1-6

How lonely sits the city that once was full of people! How like a widow she has become, she that was great among the nations! She that was a princess among the provinces has become a vassal. She weeps bitterly in the night, with tears on her cheeks; among all her lovers she has no one to comfort her; all her friends have dealt treacherously with her, they have become her enemies. Judah has gone into exile with suffering and hard servitude; she lives now among the nations, and finds no resting place; her pursuers have all overtaken her in the midst of her distress. The roads to Zion mourn, for no one comes to the festivals; all her gates are desolate, her priests groan; her young girls grieve, and her lot is bitter. Her foes have become the masters, her enemies prosper, because the Lord has made her suffer for the multitude of her transgressions; her children have gone away, captives before the foe. From daughter Zion has departed all her majesty. Her princes have become like stags that find no pasture; they fled without strength before the pursuer.

#### **Psalm 137**

By the waters of Babylon we sat down and wept, when we remembered you, O Zion.

As for our harps, we hung them up on the trees in the midst of that land. For those who led us away captive asked us for a song, and our oppressors called for mirth: "Sing us one of the songs of Zion."

How shall we sing the Lord's song upon an alien soil? If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my strong hand forget its skill. Let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember you, if I do not set Jerusalem above my highest joy.

O Daughter of Babylon, doomed to destruction, happy the one who pays you back for what you have done to us! Happy shall be the one who takes your little ones, and dashes them against the rock!

# Second Reading 2 Timothy 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. I am grateful to God - whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did - when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your

tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the lying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline. Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.





## THE CALENDAR

#### **Our Creation**

The Genesis creation story makes clear that the Earth and all that is in it is being created for us. Creation never stops. Think of our children and grandchildren, think of volcanoes or simply the spring. Over the last 400 years, we have magnified the separation Genesis implies between the Creation, we often call it Nature, and ourselves. We are, of course, natural beings but, since the 17<sup>th</sup> century, we have placed ourselves aside from Nature, even above it. The Red River diversion channel at Winnipeg, for instance, has saved the city three times so far from catastrophic flooding. Engineers may believe they are God's agents.

Many of our ideas about Nature concern how it should be, and some stem from the Romantic revolution of the early 19<sup>th</sup> century. We have our archetypes: the landscape paintings of Constable; the Arcadian poetry of Virgil; and the witty novels of Jane Austen. Nature is tame in these influential works, is pleasant, is courteous, and is ordered. In all of these cases, it is an idyll and the idyllic is represented by the country estate, a mansion surrounded by a park. The park is Paradise. No wonder we call it Rockcliffe Park. Well-behaved peasants may populate the landscape, but they are incidental. Constable described his beloved valley of the River Stour: *Every step I take and to whatever object I turn my eye, that sublime expression in the Scriptures, "I am the resurrection and the life", seems verified about me.* That is, until he encountered the people of the land: *The poor people are dirty and to approach one of the cottages is almost insufferable.* 

But people are part of the Creation, whether we like it or not. Will Creation look after itself? Of course it will, but not in ways we might like. The famine that gripped England after the end of the Napoleonic wars (1815) led to rioting and proto-Agricultural Workers' organizations, that were resisted by the gentry. John Constable again: *There are no such corrupt hoardes as any set of mechanics who work in a shop together as a party* ... We still hear similar remarks.

In Canada, our gardens order nature but our great wilderness replaces the Stour valley. Taming of this land is beyond our reach. Commonly expressed views on its inhabitants are remarkably similar in tone to Constable's. Would that we might treasure all of God's creation.
