
THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading

Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18

In the first year of King Belshazzar of Babylon, Daniel had a dream and visions of his head as he lay in bed. Then he wrote down the dream: I, Daniel, saw in my vision by night the four winds of heaven stirring up the great sea, and four great beasts came up out of the sea, different from one another. As for me, Daniel, my spirit was troubled within me, and the visions of my head terrified me. I approached one of the attendants to ask him the truth concerning all this. So he said that he would disclose to me the interpretation of the matter: "As for these four great beasts, four kings shall arise out of the earth. But the holy ones of the Most High shall receive the kingdom and possess the kingdom forever - forever and ever."

In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory. I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.





THE CALENDAR

All Souls

All Soul's College, Oxford, has no students. It is a college of fellows for advanced study. It was founded in 1438 by the archbishop of Canterbury and King Henry VI as a chantry to pray for the souls of the founders and *all the faithful departed*, and as a place for study. All the deceased are remembered regularly at services in the college chapel. Several years ago, but in this millennium, the Charity Commissioners, the body in England that ensures charities are fulfilling their mission, commended this and described it as a *public benefit*. Notwithstanding the foundation, a hundred years after Henry VI, Edward VI discontinued all chantries and discouraged prayer for the dead. The Reformation had abolished Purgatory.

The landscape we will inhabit when we die is not known to any of us. It is a principle of faith and a place for our imaginations. The topography of this landscape has changed over time. The medieval vision of Heaven, Hell, Purgatory, and Limbo is not one we recognize. At one point, John Donne called Limbo and Purgatory the suburbs of Hell. The Bible writers thought we would rest until the resurrection on the Last Day. The trumpet shall sound and the dead shall be raised we hear in Handel's Messiah (1 Cor. 15: 52). Some churches teach this and mention it at their funerals. It is the Church penitent, accompanying the Church triumphant and the Church militant we heard about last week. There is continuity between our life here and our life across the bar.

John Donne began and concluded his commemoration sermon for Magdalen Herbert with a prayer for the dead and the living asking God to hasten the day of resurrection *for our sakes* and *for her sake, whom we have lately laid down in this thy holy ground*. This petition is the basis for commemoration of the faithful departed, ignored until after the First World War, when commemoration of the dead was urgently needed, as soldiers were buried in the field and there were no funerals at home. The proposed revised Prayer Book of 1928 included a collect for the Commemoration of All Souls, and, more gently, that we, following the good example of those who have loved and served thee here and are now at rest, may at the last enter with them into the fulness of thine unending joy. The BAS is less insistent upon the Second Coming: We pray to you for those we love, but see no longer. Grant them your peace, and in your loving wisdom and mighty power, work in them the good purpose of your perfect will. The intention is close to how we pray for our own community. It seems the work of all souls is not done nor their pilgrimage over. From Peter Knott:

O Lord God, from whom we come, in whom we are enfolded, to whom we shall return.
Bless us in our pilgrimage through life, with the power of the Father protecting, with the love of Jesus indwelling, and the light of the spirit guiding, until we come to our ending in life and love eternal.
